BRICK FUNDRAISER: A third set of bricks were dedicated and placed in the walkway on May 15th, 2005. (We want to thank Sergio Lourenco, the Portuguese Mason, for donating his time and talent to the continued evolution of this walkway.) Through the sale of these bricks which lead to the front door of the Hetfield House, the MHPC is raising funds to write and publish an updated history book of our Borough's history from 1945 to present. The History of Mountainside by Jean Hesketh-Hershey covers the history until 1945 (copies are available for \$5 each, call 789-9420). Most of our town's development occurred since 1945, so the writing of this history is quite an undertaking. 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20 YEARS SINCE DRAMATIC HETFIELD HOUSE MOVE

The following article appeared in the Courier News on July 1, 1985. It captured the true drama of what it was like for observers to see the Hetfield House as it was moved over 20 years ago on Saturday, June 29, 1985!

HOME BECOMES ROAD-HOUSE

MOUNTAINSIDE - It weighed 115 tons, traveled 3mph, closed Route 22 and attracted hundreds of curious onlookers Saturday morning. It was one of the oldest homes in the borough, being moved to a new home, via one of the busiest highways in the state.

"This is one of the most remarkable things

I've ever seen," said Barbara Ackerman of Westfield. "It was thrilling just being able to stand in the middle of Route 22. I've gotten a whole new perspective of the area.

"I've grown up watching this house and I'm glad it's being taken care of," she said.

The house, which dates to 1755, originally was owned by Deacon Andrew Hetfield of the Presbyterian Church of Westfield when what is now Route 22 was a dirt road.

The move was the second for the Hetfield house. In 1929 the house, located across the roadway from Echo Lake Park, was moved about 50 yards to make way for the highway, which at the time was called Route 29.

During the 1930's and 40's the house was used as a tea room.

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The Hetfield House as it appeared on Saturday, June 29, 1985 traveling westbound on Rt. 22 as it was moved to its current location near the Mountainside Library.

HETFIELD HOUSE RECEIVES NEW COAT OF PAINT: After years of fundraising and waiting, the Hetfield House has a new coat of paint. Completed in August, the paint is similar to the previous colors but the front door sports a new shade of red. We await repairs to the front

steps and side porch which we expect to be done soon. Thanks to your generous donations and participation in our annual fund drive, we are able to complete this work on the Hetfield House.

CRAFT SHOWS SCHEDULED AT HETFIELD HOUSE: The popular craft shows will continue at the Hetfield House for the Fall, Holiday and Spring. Fall shows are scheduled September 21st through October 2nd (Wed. thru Sun.). Stop by with the family on weekends to enjoy special activities such as face painting, temporary tattoos, and support the Hetfield House by purchasing giant mums (3 for \$12). The Holiday show will take place the weekends before and after Thanksgiving. The Spring show will occur the weekend before Mother's Day in May.

FOUR CENTURIES IN A WEEKEND OPEN HOUSE: Union County's Four Centuries in a Weekend event will take place Sat. Oct.15th (10am-5pm) and Sat.Oct.16th (12 - 5pm). The Deacon

Andrew Hetfield House will be open for tours and events during this weekend on Saturday and Sunday. Please stop by and enjoy Mountainside's historic treasure.

20 YEARS since dramatic Hetfield House move

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About 400 curious spectators - many of them clutching cameras, children or coffee - crowded onto a closed-off portion of Route 22 westbound to watch the move.

The half-mile journey along Route 22 to a new location near the borough library took about three hours as crewmen from Mullen and Ranalli, Inc. of Mount Holly guided the building along the highway.

The most difficult part of the move occurred after the 28-wheel dolly carrying the house left the highway and had to cross an area still muddy from recent rains. Crewmen had to repeatedly run beneath the house to place planks over the muddy areas.

At the same time, the crewmen had to saw off troublesome branches from trees on either side.

Even before the house left the highway, the journey was a stop-and-go affair as street lights were dismantled.

In June, 1984, the home was purchased by Walter Kuczynski and his son, Robert, who intended to clear the one-acre site to make way for a manufacturing complex for electrical components. The Kuczynskis were unaware of the historic significance of the home.

Fern Carter Hyde, chairwoman of the

Mountainside Historic Preservation Committee, learned about the plans in December and asked the Kuczynskis if they would delay construction until a means could be found to save the house.

"They were very cooperative about it," Hyde said.

But Robert Kuczynski said he was concerned that the house might not be moved in time for his own project to be completed before winter.

"I told Hyde I would push back the construction date as long as I could, but I didn't know how long I could wait," he said as he watched the move on Saturday.

Fred Ranalli, who began moving houses when he was 13 (and has been in the business for about 30 years), said the operation went according to plan.

"This is about par for the course," he said.

Before the move began, he and his men made several inspections of the house and determined the best route.

Twenty steel beams were inserted beneath the house and a hydraulic lift was used to set the house on the dolly.

Once the house was moved off Route 22, it took about two more hours to haul it to the library site.

An overpass just before New Providence Road prohibited the use of that road. A wooded area leading to the library was cleared, which served as a shortcut to the new location.

Today, the house was scheduled to be moved to the excavated site. The steel beams will remain in place until a new foundation is built.

"There are no two situations exactly alike," said Ranalli, who said he moves about 100 houses a year.

Mountainside Business Administrator James Roberts said that officials and concerned townspeople planned and executed the relocation project in six months. Under normal circumstances, such a task would have taken about a year, Roberts said.

The move is expected to cost about \$66,000, including fees from the state Department of Transportation, New Jersey Bell and Public Service Electric & Gas Co.

The Borough Council approved a bond ordinance to cover the fees.

A fund drive will begin in the fall to help furnish the house, which will be used to store the town's archives and for community functions.

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Editor's Note: The Deacon Andrew Hetfield House is still the property of the Borough of Mountainside and is maintained by the Mountainside Historic Preservation Committee through funds raised by the group.
